The Chair's REPORT

WELCOME

We currently have four parish councillors; Graham Bushell, Tim Wheaton, David Lewis and Martin Goddard but never to forget the real power, Alan Kemp our Parish Clerk.

During the pandemic, your Parish Council has continued monthly meetings, albeit for some of the time via Zoom. In spite of Covid, we have done our best to maintain the infrastructure of the Village but have faced some significant challenges.

LANDSCAPING AND DRAINS

We became increasingly impatient with the lack of maintenance of both the drains and the lack of general upkeep of pavements and hedges. Whilst we appreciated the difficulties that Milton Keynes face both financially and with Covid restrictions, we insisted on a meeting with Milton Keynes management. On the 5th October Cllrs. Graham Bushell, Martin Goddard and Ward Councillor David Hopkins met with Messrs. Cox and Darling from Milton Keynes and we believe that even they were shocked at the state of the village; weeds growing 18 inches high from the pavements and paths impassable because of overgrown foliage. It certainly worked; over the next two weeks contractors

moved into the village and did a tremendous amount of work on the landscaping, paths and drains. There are still some areas which require attention and we will request that they are dealt with as well.

FUTURE MAINTENANCE

Milton Keynes (along with many councils) are divesting themselves of the responsibility to maintain villages. This means that we must take responsibility and incur the cost over and above an allowance given by MK. We are currently considering our options but we have already decided that we cannot 'go it alone' and need to partner with other nearby villages or rely on the contractors recommended by MK. We have been increasing the Precept over the last few years to ensure that we will have the funds to pay the increased cost.

SPEED LIMIT AND ROAD SAFETY

Out Speed Indicator Devices prove that we do have a speeding problem on Watling Street and for this reason we have requested that a 20 mph speed limit to be applied in the village. This is ongoing and being considered by MK. Additionally, we have asked for a safety review to find a solution to the danger of cars pulling out onto Watling Street from Great Brickhill Lane.

FLY TIPPING

Villagers will notice that we do have a fly tipping issue. If you see anyone in the act of fly tipping, do not approach them but if you do get an opportunity to take a photo of them in the act together with their licence plate number, please do so. Milton Keynes are excellent at collecting the rubbish created by these selfish individuals and you can report an incident on the MK website www.milton-keynes.gov.uk

ANTISOCIAL BEHAVIOUR

We are aware of groups of youths who meet in the derelict barns on the Duke's estate in Woburn Road. We have reported this to the Woburn estate office and they did improve the fencing but this has since been torn down and they say they are intending to reinstate it again.

WATSON FIELD

The Parish Council has instructed contractors to replace the broken fencing around Watson Field. There has been some discussion recently about the pros and cons of dogs on the field. Your Parish Council takes the view that because children constantly use the field it is an unacceptable hazard to allow dogs on the field; unfortunately, dog faeces carry toxocarasis which is a bug which can cause blindness or even death to

children. Please protect our children, do not take your dog on Watson Field.

CLIMATE CHANGE

We are keen to do our bit to protect the planet against Climate Change and Cllr. Goddard has accepted the brief to determine ways which Little Brickhill can play their part including rewilding and tree planting projects.

SCHOOL TRANSPORT

Following relentless campaigning by Cllr Wheaton, there is currently a chargeable school bus service, in its second year of service, from Little Brickhill to Walton High school, which is the second-closest high school to Little Brickhill after Sir Herbert Leon Academy.

THANK YOU

The Parish Council are blessed to have two people who valiantly support us; our Parish Clerk Alan Kemp and our Ward Councillor David Hopkins (assisted by Cllrs. Victoria Hopkins and Alice Jenkins). Alan tirelessly gives every task 100% and we have become very reliant on him. David is always available and life would be very much more difficult without his support.

Through the ages LITTLE BRICKHILL

ROMAN & SAXON PERIOD AD 43 – 1086

During the Roman occupation of Britain between AD43-410, they built an incredible network of roads including Stratum Vitelianus which at the time existed as a simple dirt track between Canterbury and St. Albans. When the Romans left, the road became known as Guntelin Street, then Watlin Street and eventually, as we know it today, Watling Street; the word street meaning straight. The name Watling may have derived from an 8th century tribe from St. Albans known as the Waeclingas (“people of Waecla”). There were several other local roads built by the Romans including links from Watling Street to Woburn, Pinfold and Soulbury which roughly followed the route of Great Brickhill Lane.

Historians believe that Watling Street (though it wasn't called that at the time) was the site of the final battle of the Romans and Queen Boudicca in AD60; although heavily outnumbered, the Romans prevailed against Iceni and the Trinovante tribes. Although the precise location of the battle is not known, most historians believe it to be between Londinium and Wroxeter (in Shropshire) and that could place it very close to our village.

There is little evidence of a Roman settlement where our village now stands although there was the major settlement of the Magiovinium between Galley Lane and the Ouzel and many Roman artefacts have been found in the village. After the Romans left, this area became part of the kingdom of Mercia.

The departure of the Romans at the beginning of the fifth century left Britain open for other invaders, Angles, Saxons and Danes. Little more is known of the area until the 9th century when Watling Street was established as a boundary between King Alfred the Great's England and the Vikings in the North so the South side of our village was under English law and the North was under Danelaw.

There was no significant settlement here during that time but as the population grew, the village was named Bryhulle or Brichella by a combination of the Celtic word for hilltop (Breg) and the Anglo Saxon word for hill (Hylle) – a hill on a hilltop. The Anglo Saxons tended to build settlements on hills as it offered superior defence. Even so, there is little evidence of a settlement but William the Conqueror's Domesday book of 1086 does offer four references for the name Bryhulle but this may have included all



three Brickhill parishes and there is no mention of a separate 'Little Brickhill'. There is reference to the Manor (probably now Manor Court, although some records suggest it is where the Grange now stands) which was owned by the Bishop of Lisieux and then by the Bishop of Bayeux, the population being just 5.

LITTLE BRICKHILL CHURCH

At the end of October, you received a letter explaining the considerable challenges facing our lovely, ancient church. Earlier everyone had been invited to a meeting to hear and discuss the concerns in person. The 33 people who came heard that at this stage we're not appealing for money. What we urgently need is people to help with a major project to maintain and, hopefully, develop our church as a central and treasured focus in our community.

We believe that most people, whether or not they want to come to services, value our church and wouldn't want to see it closed and unused. It has been standing here for 650 years, since the days of Edward 3rd, the Black Death and Geoffrey Chaucer, and it's very likely that there has been a place of worship in the same place since the 11th century or earlier. *It would be so sad if it was allowed to fall into disuse under our care!*

However, the recent architect's inspection of the building showed that a significant amount of work needs to be done simply to maintain the building and keep it weather-proof. The architect's estimate of works just to maintain the church as it is, is well in excess of £300,000.

We'd love to see the building owned and loved by everyone, for everyone in our community to make wider use of it. However, this would probably require a mains water supply and sewerage for a kitchen/servery and toilets, for a start. If there's an appetite for more ambitious plans for the use of the church the amount needed could be anything up to £750,000! There are grants available, although there's a lot of competition for them, and the village would be expected to have raised a significant percentage of the total to qualify. The task of researching and applying for grants is something which we need someone to take on.

Our earlier letter explained how the church is currently managed. This situation is simply unsustainable – these five people can't take on this task alone and we're asking that everyone considers carefully whether they could get involved with a big restoration plan for our precious church building.

At the time of writing, a small group of people have made contact to offer help, and a meeting of these people to look at ways forward is planned.

SUPPLEMENTARY PLANNING DOCUMENT

Milton Keynes Council has amended its proposals for the so-called South East Milton Keynes Development area (the land identified for up to 3000 new houses plus associated infrastructure) in the land between Woburn Sands, Wavendon, Bow Brickhill and Wavendon Gate/Old Farm Park. This follows the consultation held earlier in 2021.

The **masterplan** is due to be adopted as a Delegated Decision by Cllr Pete Marland (Leader of MK Council) on 30h November 2021.

In brief the proposed changes can be summarised as being;

- One main option for crossing the Bedford to Bletchley railway at V10 (Brickhill Street) rather than V11 through Old Farm Park and Browns Wood
- Relocated primary school closer to Wavendon
- Gypsy & Traveller site proposed now to be located at the far western end of the SEMK site close to Bow Brickhill railway station
- Widened buffer area around Wavendon
- Playing fields preferred on Woburn Sands (eastern end) of the site offering more buffer between the Groves and the new development areas
- Open space network added along Bow Brickhill Road
- Future linear park off Caldecotte Brook Linear Park, extending along Phoebe Lane (Wavendon) and passing along southern edge of Wavendon and connection to potential future growth areas to the *east of Newport Road (*to be decided in the Plan:MK2 review due to be published in 2025)
- Removed V11 (Tongwell Street) future proofed corridor south of railway line but retain open space network

- Stronger vision landscape led approach
- Focal open space provided adjacent to Spine Street
- Extended interconnected open space network

Warehouse Development at South Caldecotte – land between Bow Brickhill railway crossing and McDonalds Roundabout of the A5.

Peel Logistics Property (PLP) is holding on specific proposals for part of the ‘land at Brickhill Street’ development site in South Caldecotte, which is located adjacent to Little Brickhill Parish. Plans for the site have been progressing and I wanted to keep you informed as these proposals move forward.


As you are probably aware, despite numerous, detailed local objections, the site was allocated in Milton Keynes Council’s Local Plan and already has outline planning permission for employment uses. PLP is now preparing a detailed planning application for part of the site (Phase 2) to provide new, bespoke premises to apparently meet the needs of a specific occupier operating in the logistics and distribution market. The occupier has custom specifications that need to be accommodated through the submission of a new detailed planning application, which will be tailored to its requirements.

The proposals are for a single warehouse / logistics unit, which will incorporate a number of internal floors for the handling and processing of goods and packages. The proposals will create a significant number of high-quality jobs and deliver substantial economic benefits for the local area.

THE CONSULTATION

Ahead of submitting the planning application on these proposals for Phase 2, PLP is holding a pre-application public consultation.

Overleaf is a leaflet that the applicants are distributing



approximately 1,300 addresses surrounding the proposed site, which will arrive as the consultation begins. The leaflet contains more information about the proposals, how people can get involved and where to find out more.

The leaflet also contains an illustrative masterplan for the site, which shows the Phase 2 site. It's worth noting that this consultation is specifically regarding the Phase 2 proposals, rather than the principle of employment/logistics development on this site, which regrettably has already been agreed.

The applicants have set up a consultation website, which will go live ahead of the consultation. It will sit at www.landatbrickhillstreet.co.uk. The website will contain more detailed information and plans showing the development site. The feedback form on the website will be the main method of responding to the consultation, however our team can also be

reached by email, telephone and post (using details outlined in the leaflet).

PUBLIC CONSULTATION | 4-18 NOVEMBER 2021



PROPOSALS FOR A HIGH-QUALITY LOGISTICS SPACE TO SERVE THE GROWING DEMAND FOR WAREHOUSING

Plans for the land at Brickhill Street in South Caldecotte are progressing and we are now holding a public consultation on specific proposals for part of the site.

This leaflet contains information on our consultation, as well as instructions on how to submit feedback. You can also see an illustrative masterplan on the back of this leaflet.

BACKGROUND

The development site is a prime location for logistics operations, situated south-east of Milton Keynes, directly east of the A5 and nearby to other transport connections. The site is allocated in the Local Plan and already has outline planning permission for development for employment uses, which means that the principle of development has been confirmed by the local planning authority, Milton Keynes Council.

Peel Logistics Property (PLP) is seeking to invest in and develop a commercial and logistics park at the site to meet market demand.

As can be seen on the illustrative masterplan on the back of this leaflet, the site has two phases. **Phase 1** consists of 10 new industrial and warehousing units, and is currently going through the planning process with a Reserved Matters application having been submitted in the summer, it is anticipated that works for Phase 1 will start on site before the end of this year/beginning of 2022 subject to the relevant approvals. The proposal for Phase 2 consists of a single warehouse/logistics unit. This consultation relates to the Phase 2 site and **we are inviting comments from the local community on these proposals for Phase 2.**

OUR PROPOSALS

The demand for logistics and distribution space in the UK continues to grow. New high-quality warehouse spaces must be created in the right locations to keep up with this demand, which this proposal specifically responds to.

PLP will be bringing forward a detailed planning application for **Phase 2** of the site to provide new, bespoke premises to meet the needs of a specific occupier operating in the logistics and distribution market.

The occupier has custom specifications that mean this proposal will need to be accommodated through the submission of a new detailed planning application, which is tailored to its requirements.

The unit will be used for logistics and distribution in a single building, which will incorporate a number of internal floors for the handling and processing of goods and packages.

The site is in a strategic location with excellent road links and transport connections, meaning it is an ideal location for these operations.

The proposals will create a significant number of high-quality jobs in a growing industry, securing significant direct and indirect economic benefits.

In advance of submitting this detailed planning application, PLP is carrying out pre-application consultation. We encourage you to read more about our plans on our project website (more information overleaf) and to submit any views you have as part of the consultation.

PLP is looking to submit a detailed planning application for **Phase 2** of the site to Milton Keynes Council at the beginning of 2022.
